## **PERSONNEL**

### **Police Officers**

Three police officers retired in 2010.

Sgt. Nick DiMaggio was hired in August 1982. He was promoted to Sgt. in September of 1992. DiMaggio was injured in an auto accident in August 2005 and was out of work long term due to injuries he suffered from this accident. During 2009, a hearing was held to see if DiMaggio could return to work in either a full or light duty capacity. In 2010, the results of the hearing found that he could return to work, light duty. DiMaggio returned to work in March 2010 and worked light duty until September when he was notified by New York State that he was granted a disability retirement.

Sgt. Daryl Jackson was hired by the Village in January 1988 and was promoted to Sgt. in March 2005. Sgt. Jackson retired in September 2010. Officer Chuck Zoccolillo was hired by the Village in August 1988 and retired in April 2010. Both Jackson and Zoccolillo were popular officers who interacted well with both the community and their fellow police officers.

As a result of the retirement of Sgts. DiMaggio and Jackson, in October of 2010, Police Officer Jason Pallett was promoted to the position of Sergeant. Four officers were interviewed for this position and Pallett was a unanimous selection by the interview committee. After completing the required supervisor's school, Pallett was placed on patrol supervising a squad of police officers.

### **School Crossing Guards and Parking Enforcement Officers**

School Crossing Guard Shirley Hintzen retired in June after being employed for over 8 years. Hintzen started her career crossing the children of Colonial School at Pelhamdale and Boulevard. The last few years of her career were spent crossing the kids of Hutchinson School at 5<sup>th</sup> St. and 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue. Hintzen was replaced by Debbie Ripulone who was hired in May, in anticipation of Hintzen retiring, and she has performed her duties admirably at the Hutchinson School location.

The Village employs a total of 10 school crossing guards while one additional school crossing guard is utilized as a fill-in to cover when the others cannot make their assigned school post. The school crossing guards are located at strategic intersections to safely cross the children on school days.

Three Parking enforcement officers (Denise Boyle-Quatroni, Abraham Pulialakunnel and Lisa Taitt) walk/ride the main business district and other contiguous areas enforcing parking rules and regulations and perform their duties commendably sometimes under very stressful conditions. All three are efficient and effective employees and always act in a professional fashion.

### **Clerical**

Fran Champion continues to perform the job of department cleric. Mrs. Champion's work week was reduced as she took a full time position with the Town of Pelham working as an Assistant Court Clerk. As a result, she performs her Police duties before and after her Town responsibilities are completed, and sometimes works on a Saturday to keep all records current. Being that she works in the same building, when needed, she assists members of the department in filing forms, finding reports and general clerical work. This work schedule was worked out with Mrs. Champion as a cost saving measure. By not hiring another regular cleric and Mrs. Champion's ability to continue to do the work efficiently, this has allowed the Village to save some money as her salary was reduced when she transitioned over to being a full time Town employee. Mrs. Champion continues to perform all her job

assignments in an expeditious and professional manner. She works well with all officers of the department, village staff members and residents and members of the public.

## **TRAFFIC AND SAFETY**

The Pelham Police department continues to receive a Traffic Safety Grant from Westchester County, which is used to provide overtime enforcement of traffic laws. During 2010, the Police Department received and used the \$1600 grant, which was used to pay for Police Officers overtime when they are assigned strictly to enforce targeted Vehicle and Traffic Laws. The department participated in several statewide traffic initiatives such as STOP-DWI, Seat belt enforcement and Speeding enforcement.

In 2010, The Village was presented with a Gold Award from AAA, New York. The awards presentation took place in October. A gold award is presented to communities that implement programs and projects that demonstrate a superior effort at addressing local traffic issues. By continuing to work on traffic safety issues, the Village has not had a pedestrian fatality for 9 consecutive years.

## **CRIME AND RELATED**

Included in this annual report is a month-by-month report of all calls for service for 2010. Members of this department responded to approximately 4900 calls for service, which is consistent with the previous year. Also included in this annual report is a chart that shows the comparison of Part I crimes in the years 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2010. Part I crimes, as defined by the FBI, are Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny and Motor Vehicle Theft. The crime rate in Pelham was flat when comparing 2009 to 2010. Larcenies remain the most popular crime in Pelham totaling approximately 85% of the part I crimes. In reviewing the facts on many larceny cases, it is fairly obvious that in many of these incidents the crime could have been prevented with just a little common sense and a little more security awareness on the part of the victims. Bicycles continue to amount for a significant number of larcenies, but Cell phones and Ipods and similar devices now seem to be the property of choice for thieves. These small items must be locked away when not in use. Left unattended these items are very easy targets where thieves can simply steal them and place them in a pocket and walk away. Additionally, when someone is walking using one of these small items, they become a target as thieves will watch them and wait to see if they walk to a more desolate area in the Village, then make their move to grab the item. Everyone needs to be smart and observant when walking, especially at night.

Crime numbers should be viewed as a tool and a guide to assist the department in our future crime fighting techniques. Additionally, crime statistics are cyclical and continued fluctuations in the rates are expected. Crime rates in neighboring jurisdictions have seen slight increases and decreases over the past few years.

All members of the Pelham Police Department will work to the best of their ability to try and continue a previous long-term trend of crime reduction and diligently strive to protect the citizens of the Village to the best of their abilities. By continuing to partner with the community, there is no reason why this Village cannot continue to see consistent crime rates.

## **IN GENERAL**

Other documents submitted as part of the annual report are a listing of most of the training programs attended by officers of this department. Most, if not all training is done on an officer's off-duty time and therefore requires overtime pay as compensation. Also included with this annual report is a listing of all the awards that were presented as part of the department's awards ceremony that was held in June 2010. Lastly, there is a listing of Police department vehicles by make, model, year, usage and mileage.

## TRAINING 2010

Below is an overview of some of the training classes that police department members participated in during calendar 2010.

First Aid—all members were recertified in Basic First Aid training, which included CPR and the use of the defibrillator.

K9 Training—Sgt. Borsella trains twice a month as required to maintain his certification. In addition, he attended other training sessions during the year. The topics on some of these additional training sessions dealt with searching for Missing Persons, New trends and current Drug trends.

Firearms Training—all members participated in two separate sessions of Firearms training. All officers qualified, as per department Rules and Regulations, with their service weapons. In addition, all members trained with all department rifles, dart guns and less lethal weapons along with their own personal handguns. 22 of 25 members qualified as expert.

Taser—Sgt. David Condon has been recertified as a Taser instructor. He is responsible for training and re-training all other officers.

Det. Rick Deere attended an accident investigation School that was sponsored by the NYPD.

Datamaster--Sgt. Anthony Borsella and PO Danny Green were trained and certified to operate the datamaster which is the instrument used in determining the blood alcohol level of suspected drunk drivers.

Det. John Hynes and PO Brian Hendrie attended a training session sponsored by Iona College about Party Patrol and Control Party Dispersal training. This dealt with Law Enforcements response to underage gatherings/parties where alcohol may be present.

All department personnel attended a Village sponsored training that dealt with Workplace Violence.

Sgt. James Mitrione attended a FEMA sponsored class that dealt with the Law Enforcement response to Weapons of Mass Destruction incidents.

Det. John Hynes attended a PACT sponsored training on Training for Intervention Procedures which dealt with educating business owners on their responsibilities and liabilities of selling/serving alcohol to underage persons.

The Pelham Incident Response Team participated in training in the following areas; building entries and searches, open/wooded area searches, barricaded subjects scenarios and vehicle assaults. Training consists of recertification's/qualifications in tactical rifles, tactical pistols, tactical shotguns, less lethal weapons (Taser, Bean Bag, etc.), First Aid and CPR. They also conducted training exercises using a FATS (Firearms Training Simulator); they participated in Active Shooter Scenarios utilizing simunition rounds and they also trained on Officer Down drills and scenarios. Each year they undergo a physical fitness qualification course, similar to the Cooper test, which is the physical fitness test that is taken and must be passed by all rookie police officers.

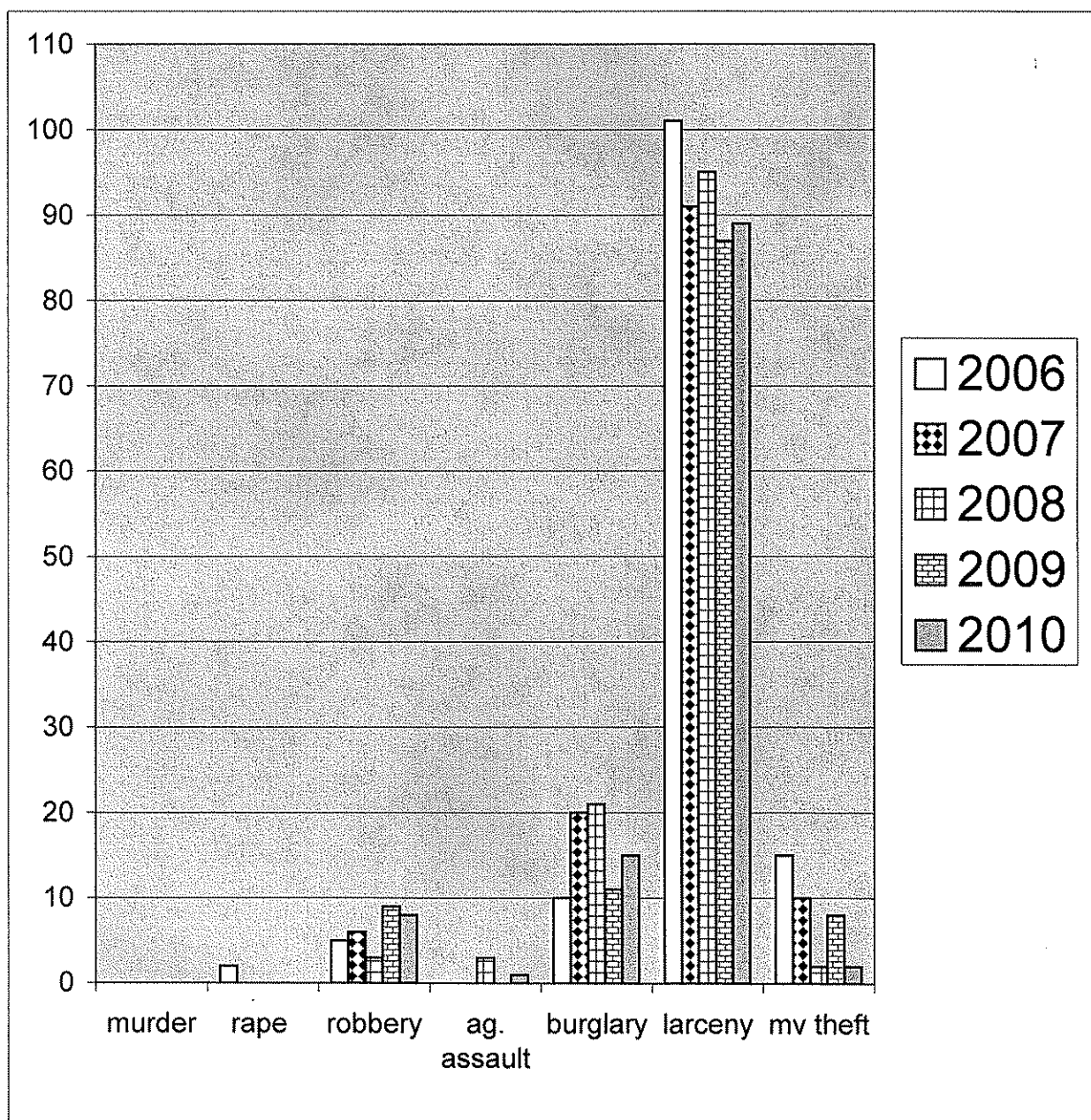
In addition to Training, several Police officers instructed a number of classes, mostly at the Westchester County Police Academy on several topics, some of which were: Patrol Observation; Handling and Processing of Juveniles; Interview and Interrogation; Traffic Stops, Communication and Interpersonal Skills.

Det John Hynes and Police Officer Brian Hendrie taught the DARE program to the 5<sup>th</sup> grade students at both Hutchinson and Colonial Elementary Schools. The officers met with the students once a week for 17 weeks teaching them the dangers of drugs and how to effectively deal with peer pressure. Because of our long term commitment to DARE, in June, six local students accompanied Det. Hynes to LaGuardia airport to participate in an advertising campaign supporting this program. The Police Department and the Schools have been partners in this program since 1992.

Lastly, on many occasions during the year, police officers engage in public relations activities and participate in community programs to strengthen the bond between the community and the department. Some of these programs are: Detective for a Day raffle prize; Neighborhood safety issues to 6<sup>th</sup> grade students; Safety, including Halloween safety assemblies to grammar schools; Pelham Rec Tiny Tot program; Rotary Club presentation on Operation Safeguard; Bicycle safety tips; Jr. Wonders; Consequences of Underage Drinking to 6<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders; and, a variety of groups including boy/cub scouts, girl scouts and brownies came to police headquarters for a tour of the facility.
